PUBLIC SERVICE:

The SBC 2003 is well into the planning stages. Not only will the race be held again this year, but it is the first major race of the season on the West Coast, and has been expanded to five stages. The Rancho Solano Circuit Race, which was cancelled last year due to Easter, has been put back into the schedule, and a new time trial has been added. The new time trial is straight up Mix Canyon to the top. Those of you who have done repeater maintenance know what this climb is like.

The road race route has been changed for the better, and will avoid a lot of the problems we had last year. The road race map can be found at http://www.solanobicycleclassic.org/rrace.htm Note that the pack goes through the English Hills area early in the race, so that the road closures will be much shorter than last year.

Essentially, the race will begin at Lagoon Valley and proceed in the reverse direction from last year. Rather than coming back through Fairfield, the race will go north along Lake Berryessa and will end at the town of Angwin. The women's race will start at Winters, as soon as the men have passed through. Thus, we won't have to worry about two separate races occurring simultaneously in different places. Or something like that...

The current plan is for net control to be set up at Angwin, probably on the college grounds. We may be able to use an airborne repeater for better coverage, but this will depend on the weather, which can be unpredictable at that time of year. Donut distribution is as yet undetermined...

In summary, the road race will need the most radio coverage. The circuit race will need some coverage, but not nearly as much as the road race. The two time trials will need minimum coverage.

Schedule (brazenly stolen from KG6KCJ's web site):

THURSDAY, MARCH 27, 2003

Stage 1, Jelly Belly Road Race

This classic road race with challenging climbs will last 54 miles for the women, while the men will race for approximately 95 miles. The men will start at 9:00 am at Lagoon Valley Park, between Fairfield and Vacaville. The women will start in Winters as the men's race passes by. Both races will finish on the campus of Pacific Union College in Angwin.

FRIDAY, MARCH 28, 2003

Stage 2, Solano Garbage Time Trial

Held on Montezuma Hills Rd. (near Birds Landing), the time trial is an individual race against the clock where both men and women ride the 12.2-mile course in the shortest possible time.

SATURDAY, MARCH 29, 2003

Stage 3, Steve Larsen Hill Climb

Stage 4, MLO/Genisoy Criteriums; and Public Races

The professional riders will race twice on Saturday. In the morning, they will individually complete Stage 3 by climbing approximately 2500 ft. in 4 miles on this epic Mix Canyon time trial. The Downtown Fairfield venue will be used for Public Races on Saturday morning. The Start/Finish line of the 1.2-mile criterium course will be located on Kentucky Street across from City Hall. In the afternoon, the Pro's will compete in Stage 4, which will consist of a 60 minute timed ride for the women and a 90-minute race for the men.

SUNDAY, MARCH 30, 2003

Stage 5, Daily Republic Circuit Race and Amateur Criterium Races

USCF Licensed Amateur Criterium races will be held on the Downtown course while the Pro's compete in Stage 5. Rancho Solano and surrounding neighborhoods will host the circuit portion of the course with riders starting and finishing in downtown Fairfield. The women's race includes 9 laps through Rancho Solano for a total of 64 miles. Men will complete 13 laps through Rancho Solano before finishing their 87-mile course.
